## WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT FROM ME AS YOUR MENTOR

By welcoming you into my group, you can count on me to:

- provide a supportive and inclusive environment
- support you in your project, including providing suitable training and resources if I can't provide this myself for whatever reason, I will facilitate it for you
- meet with you regularly
- work on a development plan with you so that we can collaborate on planning and meeting your own goals, and building the skills that are important to you

- provide feedback on analysis, drafts, etc in a timely manner
- do whatever I can to help you in your career path, whether you decide that is in science or not

I am excited to have you in my group! I can't promise I will get everything right the first time, but I can promise that where I fall short, I want to know that so I can do better. If you feel that something is missing from this list, or that I am not meeting these expectations in some way, please tell me.

## WHAT I EXPECT FROM YOU

In brief, the basic things I expect of group members is that you:

- take responsibility for your project, and your development goals I will of course be here to guide you throughout, but ultimately this is your research experience and it's up to you to be the motivating force behind it
- uphold high standards of research integrity don't steal or fabricate data, and don't plagiarise
- communicate with me about your needs, progress, and wellbeing
- participate in group meetings and departmental events, and make the most of being in such a wonderful hub of research
- be a good lab-mate (see above: be kind). Bullying, harassment, or discrimination of any kind will not be tolerated

A note on work hours: I fully recognise that everyone has different optimal working hours, and luckily academic research can accommodate this to a large degree. While I generally keep to a 9-5ish work day, I know this doesn't work for everyone, and I won't be policing your inoffice hours. However, I do expect that all members will be physically present for a reasonable number of hours during the week, which will change depending on circumstances. As we've learned during the COVID pandemic – research in isolation can be a lonely and demoralising experience! So I do encourage you to make the most of your peer group, and I expect everyone to attend group meetings and journal clubs in-person or virtually. But as always, communicate with me about your needs.

While I want you to work hard, I strongly believe in the importance of work-life balance and I expect the same of you. Your physical and mental health always comes above research. Please take holidays as though this was a regular job. Overworking has deleterious effects and I do not expect you to work outside normal work hours. Burnout is common and we want to avoid it.

\*A note on the group name! I thought long and hard about potential names for the research group that would signify a unifying theme as well as being unique – and I'm not sure such a name exists given the broad range of research topics we could conceivably cover, and not being limited to one species or taxonomic group. In the end, I decided that naming the group after myself provides a simple touchstone that will unite all our work – it is not meant to suggest ownership of ideas, or research.
